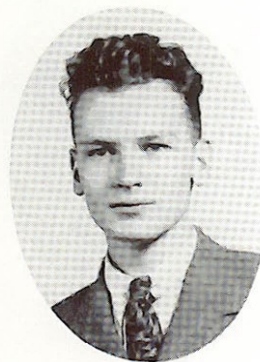

Many thanks are due to Mr. Perrin for his skilful conducting and unflinching patience.



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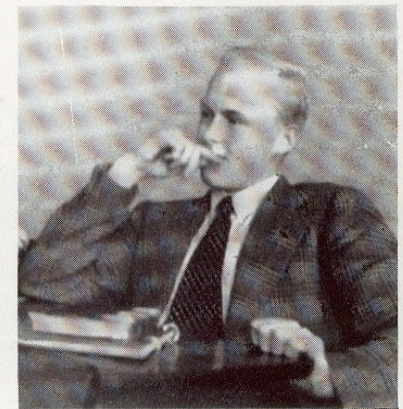

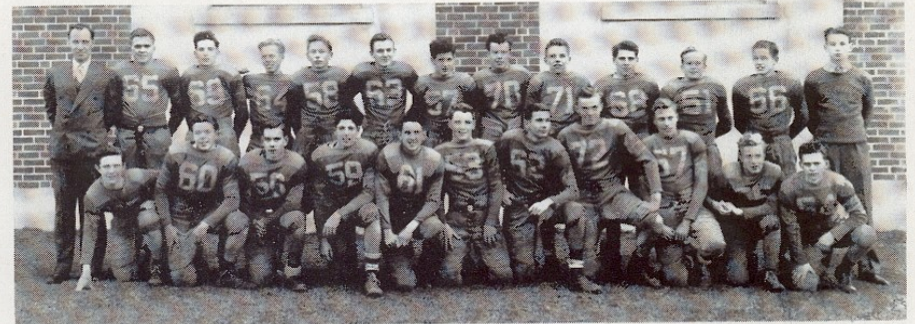
passes to score touchdowns unmolested. White, Jarvis, and Rapson were the best for Lawrence Park.

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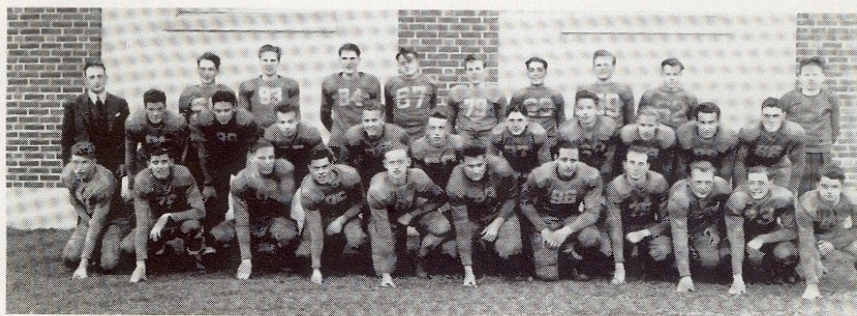

Final score: Central Commerce 6, Lawrence 1.

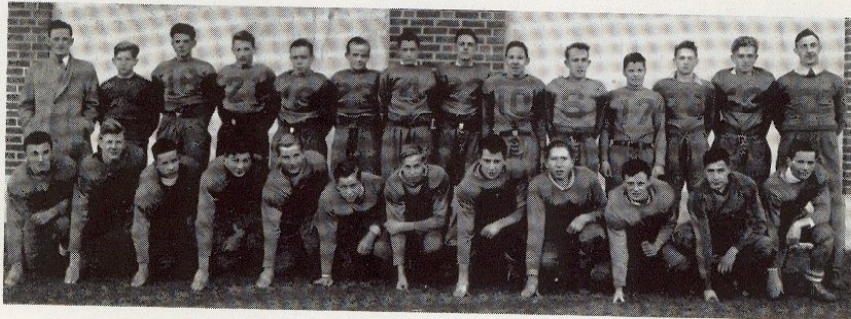
